Your Rights and Responsibilities

As a new U.S. resident, understanding your rights and responsibilities helps you maintain legal status and progress toward citizenship.

Your Rights



Work Anywhere in the U.S. without employer restrictions.



File Taxes and report worldwide income.

Your Responsibilities



Legal Protection under federal, state, and local laws.



Follow Laws and support the U.S. government.



Travel Freely but follow re-entry rules.



Register for Selective Service if male, 18-25.



Sponsor Family for their own green cards.



Maintain Residency to avoid losing status.

Getting Settled in the United States

Adjusting to life in the U.S. requires important first steps. This guide will help you transition smoothly and settle in with ease.



- Get a Social Security
 Number because it's
 needed for work, banking,
 and government services.
- 2 Find a place to live using temporary housing options or rental sites.
- Look for a job through online searches, job centers, and portals like <u>USAJobs.gov.</u>
- Set up finances with a U.S. bank account and an understanding of credit scores.
- **Understand transportation** with public transit, a driver's license, and navigation apps like Google Maps.
- 6 Get health insurance from an employer, Medicaid, or Medicare, with options available on HealthCare.gov.
- **Set up essential utilities** such as electricity, water, gas, and internet before moving in.
- 8 Know your emergency contacts by calling 911 for emergencies and 311 for city services.

Maintaining Your Resident Status

To keep your permanent residency, you must follow U.S. immigration rules and avoid actions that could lead to losing your Green Card.

Keep Your Status Active



Green Card Renewal

Avoid long trips or actions that show intent to move abroad, as they may affect your residency.

Renew your green card every 10 years using Form I-90.

Residency Requirements

You must reside in the U.S. and maintain strong ties like paying taxes and keeping a U.S. address.



Education and Health Care

As a new resident, the U.S. offers your family free access to public schools, educational support, and lifelong learning opportunities. Here's what you need to know:



Schools

Public schools are free and based on your address, while private schools charge tuition and may offer religious or specialized education.



Language Support

Free or low-cost ESL classes offered at schools, libraries, and online at USALearns.org.



College & Trade School

There are community colleges, universities, and job training programs available.



Special Education

Children with disabilities are entitled to free services and personalized support.

Health insurance is essential and often comes from a job, private plan, or programs like Medicaid or CHIP. Here's what to expect in U.S. health care:



Primary Care

Routine checkups and doctor visits for general health.



Emergency Care

Hospitals must treat emergencies, even without insurance.



Specialist Care

Referrals may be needed for services like dermatology or physical therapy.



Mental Health Suppor

Many insurance plans include therapy and counseling.

Working in the U.S.

Talk to friends, neighbors, or community members about job openings.

Explore job types, pay, and skills at the Occupational Outlook Handbook.



Go to an American Job Center for free inperson job search support.

Becoming a U S Citizen

Becoming a U.S. citizen gives you important new rights and responsibilities, such as voting in elections and applying for federal government jobs. Learn what citizenship means and how to begin the process.



Why Apply for Citizenship?

Citizens can vote, run for office, sponsor family more quickly, and access more opportunities, including federal jobs and scholarships.



How to Get Started

Make sure you're eligible, fill out Form N-400, complete your biometrics and interview, then take the oath. Learn more at <u>uscis.gov/citizenship</u>.



You must be 18 years old and have a green card for 5 years.



You must have a good moral character with no criminal record.



You must pledge loyalty to the U.S. by taking the Oath of Allegiance.

Basic Requirements



You need basic English skills and must pass a U.S. civics test.



You must live in the U.S. for at least 30 months out of the last 5 years
